OBJECTIVE

The fund's primary investment objective is to seek a high level of current income. The fund's secondary objective is long-term growth of capital.

INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The Fund allocates its assets between two separate investment strategies, or sleeves. Under normal market conditions, the fund allocates approximately 80% of its total assets to an equity sleeve comprised primarily of common stocks and other equity securities that offer above-average potential for current and/or future dividends. This sleeve invests normally in approximately 60 to 80 securities, broadly diversified among major sectors and regions. The sector and region weights are typically within +/- 5 percent of weights in the Morgan Stanley Capital International (MSCI) All Country World Index (ACWI) (Net)³. The remaining 20% of the fund's total assets is allocated to a sleeve consisting of below investment grade (high yield) debt. The fund also employs an option strategy in an attempt to generate gains on call options written by the fund.



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Strategy

The MSCI All Country World Index3 (ACWI) (Net) finished 8.20% higher during the first quarter of 2024. The S&P 500 Index4 rallied 10.56%, the MSCI EAFE Index (Net)5 gained 5.78%, and the MSCI Emerging Markets Index (Net)⁶ rose by only 2.37%. Global equity markets were supported by a more dovish tone by major central banks, disinflationary trends, momentum from artificial intelligence (Al) secular growth themes, stable 2024 corporate earnings estimates, and expectations for a soft/no landing for many developed economies. West Texas Intermediate crude oil prices rose 17%. global large caps outperformed small caps, and growth outperformed value.

In general, all major central banks followed the lead of the U.S., with the banks of England, China, Canada, and Korea and the European Central Bank holding rates constant during the quarter. One notable exception was the Bank of Japan, which announced an end to its yield curve control policy and instituted its first-rate hike in 17 years, becoming the last central bank to exit negative rate territory. Many emerging market central banks in Latin America and Eastern Europe have ended their tightening cycle and have begun easing monetary policy.

High yield bonds and leveraged loans generated strong performance during the quarter as a continuation of the risk rally from the fourth quarter drove demand, pushing bond and loan prices higher. Issuer fundamentals and credit quality remain stable and at historically constructive levels, while defaults continue to trend between 2% and 3%, which is low historically speaking. Corporate debt issuance was very strong during the quarter as a surge of inflows into mutual funds and exchange-traded funds aligned with lower yields to incentivize borrowers to tap the market for fresh funding. The Global Dividend Opportunity Fund's return was 10.84% for the three-month period that ended March 31, 2024, outperforming the 6.84% return of the Global Dividend Opportunity Blended

Contributors to performance

Within the equity sleeve, the strategy often underperforms the MSCI ACWI (Net) when growth outperforms value; however, the first quarter was an exception due to positive stock selection results within the information technology (IT), industrials, and financials sectors. An underweight to consumer staples also contributed modestly to results. From a regional perspective, positive stock selection within the U.S., Japan, and Europe contributed to relative performance. A lack of exposure to emerging markets also contributed modestly to results. Individual positive names of note included Dell Technologies, EMCO Group, and Taiwan Semiconductor.

Within high yield, the sleeve's overweight to floating-rate leveraged loans added value as they outperformed fixed-rate bonds on the changing expectation of higher-for-longer rates. An underweight to telecommunications also contributed, as the sector continues to underperform. On an individual-name basis, Werner Finco, CoreCivic, and Dish DBS were the largest contributors.

Detractors from performance

An overweight to real estate, which was the worst-performing sector of the MSCI ACWI (Net) during the quarter (-1%), and negative stock selection within health care and energy detracted from results. Negative stock selection within Canada, Australia/New Zealand, and Latin America detracted from performance. An overweight to the U.K. and Ireland detracted modestly from results. Stock selection in companies at the high (>8%) end of the yield spectrum detracted from relative performance. Individual negative names of note included China Medical Systems, Barratt Developments, and Open Text Corp.

Within the fund's high yield sleeve, an overweight to media detracted as the sector continues to grapple with secularly declining businesses. On an individual-name basis, Scripps Escrow, Enviva Partners, and Charter Communications were the largest detractors.

Management outlook

As we enter the second quarter of 2024, the lagged effects of tighter monetary policy and a withdrawal of COVID-19 fiscal stimulus are weighing on global growth. Gross domestic product growth is decelerating or stagnant across most developed and emerging markets, but most major economies should avoid a hard landing in 2024. Higher short-term rates haven't fully tamed inflation in the U.S., but core inflation remains on a downward trend. A resilient U.S. economy appears to be approaching a soft/no landing and will likely continue outperforming other developed markets. The stronger dollar has been a headwind for emerging markets and a U.S. rate cutting cycle would benefit emerging markets relative to the U.S.

We currently anticipate volatile and range-bound markets and are mindful to neutralize our exposures to macroeconomic and geopolitical risks where possible. While we are generally cautious, there are potential positive catalysts from decelerating inflation, a resilient developed labor market, improving corporate earnings, and a broadening of market returns. As we monitor the macroeconomic environment, we will continue to diligently focus on company fundamentals and disciplined portfolio risk management.

High yield and leveraged loans continue to offer attractive yields that should outpace current rates of inflation and offset future economic volatility. Issuer fundamentals and balance sheets are healthy and a key reason for low defaults and spread compression. Resilient economic growth and the possibility of a Federal Reserve (Fed) rate cut create a favorable backdrop for corporate credit, low defaults, and spread compression. This is perhaps why investors seem more focused on yields than credit spreads, hoping to position themselves to benefit from both an eventual Fed easing and yields, which are attractive compared with the post-Global Financial Crisis period.
